Pastors Fidelis and Kalysa Wandera continue to serve those who are incarcerated. Through your support, they helped to improve the health of mothers and their children, including preventing illness resulting from the cold winters.

In Kenya, children under four years of age often accompany their mothers to prison. Unfortunately, the governmental budget is insufficient to meet the full expense of caring for mother and child, such as providing adequate winter clothing. This leads to illnesses such as tuberculosis and pneumonia, hospitalization, and sometimes death.

Recent prison reforms offer some hope. Now, persons with terms of less than five years may be trained in sewing and knitting, or wood and metal work. Though resources for this program are limited, a delivery of thread by the Wanderas enabled female prisoners to begin making sweaters for inmates and their children.

Another concern is the susceptibility of children to sickness when they play on the concrete floors. The Wanderas responded by

providing rugs for the children. They also delivered sanitary supplies for the
